These cases have unfortunately reinforced a truth survivors have long known: that the world too often protects power over survivors and that there is still much work to be done to achieve our vision of ending sexual violence and fostering a safe, supportive, just and equitable society. More than ever, SAVIS's work in public education, counselling, outreach, and anti-human trafficking initiatives is not just relevant, it is essential.

As I reflect on my second year as Chair of the Board of Directors at SAVIS of Halton, my heart is full of gratitude - for the courage of the survivors we serve, the unwavering dedication of our staff and volunteers, the continuing support of donors and sponsors, and the deep compassion of our community. SAVIS's work is rooted in the belief that everyone deserves to live free from violence and exploitation and this past year that belief has guided our work.

Our public education programming continues to address and challenge harmful cultural narratives that normalize abuse, excuse perpetrators, and silence survivors. Over the past year, we significantly expanded our outreach efforts, engaging more individuals than ever before through education, prevention, and awareness initiatives. Our team delivered customized presentations across Halton in diverse settings—including classrooms, community centres, youth groups, and newcomer organizations—covering critical topics such as consent, healthy relationships, and the realities of sexual violence and human trafficking in our region. This proactive work not only informs and empowers individuals but also strengthens community ties and fosters a culture of prevention.

Our counselling programs continued to provide something truly transformative: support and connection. Expanding our group counselling sessions, SAVIS has sought to create safe healing spaces where survivors find not just support, but each other. They share their stories, their pain, and their strength. The consistent demand and positive feedback reinforce the message that no one heals alone.

Our anti-human trafficking program continues to address both the visible and hidden faces of exploitation. We know trafficking does not always conform to public

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stereotypes. It occurs in our Region, suburbs, and online spaces. Our human trafficking staff supported survivors with wraparound services that prioritize autonomy, safety, and long-term recovery. From crisis intervention to transitional housing referrals and court support, SAVIS continues to stand as a trusted and trauma-informed partner in this complex work.

None of our work would be possible without the generous support of our donors, sponsors, community and government partners, dedicated volunteers, and our staff. To every individual, foundation, agency, and organization that contributed time, resources, or funding, we extend our heartfelt thanks. Your investment in this mission directly impacts lives and enables SAVIS to continue delivering vital, trauma-informed programs that meet people with compassion, self-worth, and care.

## Executive Director's Report

As I reflect on the past year, I want to extend my deepest gratitude to our community for your ongoing support of the vital work that SAVIS does.

As shared by the Chair of our Board of Directors and our Director of Program and Services, this past year has been especially difficult for many survivors. In the face of these challenges, our collective dedication and unwavering belief in survivors continues to be the cornerstone of our work. No Names, No Judgment, Just Support has been our guiding mission for over 35 years—and it will remain so.



Over the last year, we have deepened our commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion, ensuring these values are woven into every aspect of our organization. This is a continuous journey, and one we approach with intention and care.

We also undertook a comprehensive review and update of our bylaws to align with the Ontario Not-for-Profit Corporations Act (ONCA). This important task was carried out with diligence and care by our dedicated Board of Directors.

As the demand for our services grew and our office space became increasingly limited, we were fortunate to expand into a small adjacent office. This additional space is now well-used for individual counselling, group sessions, and staff and board meetings.

This year also marked important growth in our leadership team. We created a new role, Director of Program and Services, following a rigorous hiring process. We were thrilled to welcome Anna Morgan to the role in March. Anna now leads a dedicated team working in public education, counselling, anti-human trafficking, and our 24/7 crisis line.

In recognition of the growing needs within our resource development efforts, Shelagh Nuttall, formerly our Manager of Development, was promoted to Director of Development. Her leadership has been instrumental in strengthening our capacity and reach.

SAVIS continues to work in collaboration with community partners throughout Halton. In fall 2024, I was honoured to become co-chair of the Halton Violence Prevention Council. This group of over 25 agencies works collectively to end violence in all its forms, address its impacts, and foster an inclusive, equitable, and healthy community.

In early spring 2025, SAVIS joined EFry Hope and Help for Women and Nina's Place in a critical case review process alongside the Halton Regional Police Service. We examined sexual assault cases previously classified as "unfounded." This review ensures that survivors' reports are taken seriously and not prematurely dismissed. Our shared goal is to support survivors and advocate for justice through accountability and systemic change.

We are proud of what we have accomplished together over the past year, and we remain committed to our mission, our community, and—most importantly—survivors.



# Anti-Human Trafficking Program

The Anti-Human Trafficking Program has seen an increase in referrals to the program over this past fiscal year. SAVIS of Halton is one of the few organizations that supports survivors of labour trafficking and has provided support for several survivors who have experienced labour trafficking.

The Anti-Human trafficking team also supports the Public Education work SAVIS does at awareness raising events for Anti-Human Trafficking that focus on prevention through education to vulnerable individuals at risk of human trafficking and helping communities recognize and respond to signs of trafficking. There were several Anti-Human trafficking awareness raising events that took place over the past year in collaboration with the Halton District School Board and Halton Catholic District School board for parents, students and community members. The Anti-Human trafficking program also hosted a newcomer group session with the Halton Catholic District School Board.





### Halton Collaborative Against Human Trafficking (HCAHT)

SAVIS coordinates the Halton Collaborative Against Human Trafficking, which exists to create and support a united Halton community and regional response to combat human trafficking. The Collaborative facilitated training opportunities over this last year build service providers' capacity to support survivors of human trafficking. The trainings included a session on supporting survivors of labour trafficking and a survivor-led expert panel on best practices for supporting survivors of human trafficking. The training sessions were instrumental in continuing to address the systemic barriers survivors face when trying to access services.

## Counselling

The counselling program at SAVIS of Halton continues to provide trauma-informed counselling support for survivors of sexual violence and trauma and for family members or friends supporting a loved one affected by violence. This year SAVIS of Halton received increased support from the United Way Foundation to be able to continue to have additional counselling staff as part of our team. As the rates of sexual violence and gender-based violence increase, the need for services for survivors of trauma continue to remain high and the support from donors allows us to ensure that more survivors have access to the counselling support they need to rebuild their lives. The program provided over 1300 hours of counselling support to survivors this fiscal year.

The Ontario Trillium Fund provided generous funding this last fiscal year to deliver an Art-Based Therapy group to survivors and to continue to provide staffing for overnight and weekend coverage of the SAVIS crisis line and volunteer crisis line coordination. SAVIS was able to deliver three cycles of the art-based therapy program. The expressive arts-based group offered an opportunity for participants to explore the creative process by providing a community-oriented group and providing sensory experiences to identify and articulate emotions and the opportunity to express difficult emotions.

The Night Shift Crisis Line Administrator provided increased coverage support for the 24/7 crisis line. The crisis line provided over 200 hours of crisis line counselling to over 700 crisis line contacts over the 2024-2025 fiscal year. The position also provided support for crisis line coordination ensuring that new volunteers to the program were well trained to deliver trauma informed support to survivors. They also coordinated ongoing training to volunteers, including training on the Sexual Assault Investigation guide by Victim Services and working with survivors with disabilities.





The counselling program continues to focus on expanding our reach across Halton by providing remote counselling services in Milton and Burlington. SAVIS also continues to ensure staff are trained in the most up-to-date, trauma-informed practices, supporting a safe and compassionate environment for those we serve. Counsellors were able to participate in training on Narrative-Therapy: Re-authoring Stories of Depression, Supporting Survivors of IPVrelated Traumatic Brain Injury and trainings by Grandmother's Voice, an Indigenous organization whose mission is to revive and amplify Ancestral insights and values, nurturing them for generations to come.

### Public **Education**

This year, as conversations around consent, healthy relationships, and bystander intervention has become more relevant than ever, our commitment to violence prevention through public education has remained unwavering. The Public Education program continues to be core to our mission advocating against violence in the community at large and promoting prevention through community education. Public education is a critical tool for early intervention, community engagement, and long-term systemic and cultural change and continues to be busier than ever.

PubEd continues to collaborate with the Halton District School Board and Halton Catholic District School Board to deliver workshops to students, parents and community members on topics of mental health, consent and healthy relationships – providing individuals with the knowledge and tools to build respectful, informed, and safer relationships. Pub Ed also hosted 2 presentations over 2 days with the Parent Involvement Committee Conference, supported Anti-Human Trafficking Awareness presentations and collaborated on providing input into the development of the consent education curriculum with HDSB. For this past fiscal year, public education attendees totaled over 8,500 attendees at over 150 presentations, workshops, broad community engagement and training events, which is a 150 percent increase from last fiscal year. Our Public Education is also busy in the community at local events including mental health fairs, Burlington and Milton Pride and expanding outreach to Public Libraries. They have also been delivering groups to youth at Syl Apps a residential forensic mental health facility for youth.





Public Education has also been busy providing training and education opportunities and building capacity for other service providers. In collaboration with SAVIS. the Women's Centre of Halton, and the Victim Services Unit of Halton Regional Police Service, we are hosting a workshop for professionals called "Responding to Disclosures of Sexual Violence." The workshop focused what it means to support survivors, the neurobiology of trauma, a brief outline of reporting options, the police process, and the legal system. The workshop targeted professionals who were likely to hear disclosures of either acute or historical violence in the course of their day-to-day duties.

Through workshops, outreach, and collaborative initiatives, the Public Education team has been having significant impact in fostering a culture of consent, equity, and care.

He addresses sensitive topics, such as consent, bullying and sextrafficking with empathy, clarity, and honesty.

### **Crisis** Line

Our Crisis Line responds to hundreds of calls each year, offering vital support to survivors of sexual assault and those impacted by childhood sexual abuse, sexual exploitation related to human trafficking, sexual harassment, and other forms of gender-based violence.

The line operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week. To ensure continuous support, our traumainformed staff respond to calls during business hours, while our trained volunteers provide essential coverage after hours, on weekends, and during holidays.

We held our annual Volunteer Appreciation Event in early June, bringing together volunteers, Board members, and staff for a heartfelt luncheon. This event is one small way we, at SAVIS, express our deep gratitude to the volunteers who choose to do this challenging and meaningful work. Their dedication is the foundation of what we do; and without them, our mission wouldn't be possible.




